TONY BREALY REMEMBERS...

Another thing my father, Fred Brealy, spoke about was this war-time story. He was in the garden at The Elms, where my son and his family now reside, shutting in the chickens. Planes were going over and he heard a collision of metal followed by an engine revving up.

In the village of Morchard Bishop there is a memorial stone commemorating thirteen crew of two Halifax bombers that crashed at Crookstock Farm in Morchard Bishop Parish on 15th November 1944. The planes were on a wartime exercise, flying without lights, from RAF Wombleton (near York). They had rendezvoused over Cornwall and were returning to base. It is believed that one plane rose up underneath the other and the two craft collided.

The crews were made up of eight Canadians, two Australians and four Royal Airforce Volunteers (RAFV). Sadly, the lone survivor, an Australian who was thrown clear, died in another crash one month later. Dad always believed the collision was over Zeal Monachorum but it took the distance between the two villages for them to actually come down.

- 10. 3 Tomatoes (calyces attached)
- 11. Any other vegetable i.e. Cucumber, Courgette, Lettuce

- 13. 3 Apples cooking or eating
- 14. Any other fruit
- 15. Potato in Bucket, seed potato distributed at April Market To be judged on weight of **good** potatoes only

Section 2 - FLOWERS

- 16. A fuchsia spray
- 17. 3 Dahlias decorative (single blooms, remove buds, leaves allowed)
- 18. 3 Dahlias ball (single blooms, remove buds, leaves allowed)
- 19. 3 Dahlias any other variety (single blooms, remove buds, leaves allowed)
- 20. 1 Gladiola spike
- 21. 1 specimen bloom HT rose
- 22. 1 spray floribunda / multiform rose
- 23. Spray of flowering shrub
- 24. 3 marigolds or calendulas (single blooms, remove buds, leaves allowed)
- 25. 1 vase of flowers perennials and/ or annuals 3 kinds 2 of each
- 26. 3 Sweet peas

Section 3. HOMECRAFT SECTION

- 1. Lemon drizzle cake
- 2. 3 Shortbread fingers
- 3. 3 Jam Tarts
- 4. Jar of Jam no trade names on pots or lids
- 5. Jar of Runner Bean Pickle no trade names on pots or lids
- 6. An Item of Handicraft made from Wood
- 7. An item of needlework eg knitted, crochet, stitched etc

ZEAL MONACHORUM PARISH COUNCIL

The last Parish Council meeting was held on March 28th. After apologies were heard from Ken Hogg, the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved by the council.

During the open forum, it was pointed out that, at the recent District Council bye election, no list of candidates had been posted on the PC notice board. We didn't recollect having done this in recent elections but may well be a good idea for the future. If anybody was looking for details that weren't displayed, we apologise.

We welcomed Alex White as the newly elected member of the District Council. In the Council report it was confirmed that from now on, black bag rubbish would only be collected when placed in wheelie bins, with closed lids.

We received a report from our Village Hall member outlining the improvements already completed in the hall. He reported that the PC's previous request for a contribution to the memorial seat for Ken Down had, for various reasons, been unsuccessful. The council was also informed that the Village Hall's bid for £4000 to the Den Brook Fund, necessary for future improvements, had been successful.

We had a planning application request from the developers of the houses at Monk's View to alter the agreed surrounds. Some residents in attendance objected to the changes, citing that original plans were far more 'farmstead' appropriate. The council agreed a site visit was needed, along with a copy of the original plans.

It was brought to the notice of the council that unsightly political graffiti had been daubed outside the entrance to Hayne quarry. Although some attempt had been made to cover this up, a member of the council offered to make a more effective outcome. The meeting closed at 8.10 pm. The next meeting will be held on May 30th at 7.00pm.

It seems the list of most needed items gets longer each week and these last weeks were no exception. Of course, the list changes each week but the following items tend to go out more quickly than most: tinned carrots, sweetcorn, chopped tomatoes, ham, tuna, meat meals (meatballs, hot dogs, Ravioli), fruit, custard, jars of pasta and curry sauces, small bags of rice, small bags of sugar, breakfast cereals (not porridge), bottles of fruit squash, long life fruit juices, toilet rolls. May brings an air of excitement to the garden with Summer just around the corner! Here are some tips on what needs to be done in your garden this month.

- 1. Get instant colour with summer bedding plants, and keep deadheading them regularly to help them flower all summer long.
- 2. Apply a liquid feed to Spring bulbs to encourage them to flourish next year.
- 3. Protect less hardy plants from late frost by positioning them in elevated sunnier spots, and use fleece when frost is forecast.
- 4. Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any maincrop or 2nd earlies still remaining.
- 5. Position supports in place for perennials that are top-heavy such as peonies or phlox.
- 6. Keep on top of watering during dry spells invest in a water butt to collect any rain water if you don't already have one. Using saucers under pots with thirsty plants and ensuring new hedging is watered regularly during the first year will help ensure you have a beautiful blossoming garden for summer.
- 7. Start mowing the lawn more regularly, and apply lawn feed; you can also compost your cuttings.
- 8. Keep on top of weeds, and hoe your beds regularly, as well as using preventative weed killers.
- 9. Protect your plants from slugs using natural friendly alternatives such as Organic Slug Stop.
- 10. Plan a garden project now such as, a patio, shed or summerhouse. Get your garden furniture and BBQ now in time to enjoy them for the Summer.
